Introducing Mr. Tim Euler, Head of School What Does It Look Like?

Anytime you go to buy a big ticket item, like a house, the first question many people ask is; what does it look like? Have you ever replied with, it does not matter? Of course it matters. It is the same reason why we have mirrors in our bathrooms, we want to make sure we are presentable and have a good appearance. We spend hours each week worried about what our homes, our bodies, our cars, and all other areas of our lives look like. We spend money, resources, and hire people to clean, paint, and prep the material items in our lives. How much time have



you spent wondering what your grandchildren will look like 10, 15, 20 years from now?

Grandchildren? Yes, that is what each of us are raising. Our natural response is that we are focused on our children and what they look like spiritually, physically, and socially; but if we only think short term then we have completely missed the commandment given to us in Psalm 78.

My people, hear my instruction; listen to what I say. I will declare wise sayings; I will speak mysteries from the past— things we have heard and known and that our fathers have passed down to us. We must not hide them from their children, but must tell a future generation the praises of the LORD, His might, and the wonderful works He has performed. He established a testimony in Jacob and set up a law in Israel, which He commanded our fathers to teach to their children so that a future generation—children yet to be born—might know. They were to rise and tell their children so that they might put their confidence in God and not forget God's works, but keep His commands. Then they would not be like their fathers, a stubborn and rebellious generation, a generation whose heart was not loyal and whose spirit was not faithful to God.

(Psalm 78:1-8, Holman)

We are commanded to raise our children in a manner that establishes a Godly heritage for future generations to come. This is exactly why you invest in Cambridge Christian School. Our faculty and staff partner with you to educate your children so that when they are old they will not depart from the biblical training they have received. I speak to parents often that ask, "Why do I sacrifice and pay the tuition I pay?" My response is simple; "You are investing into generations to come." Have you ever considered what a powerful racecar would look like with no steering wheel? That's the picture of a child whose

academic education lacks the guidance of faith and character. At Cambridge, we invest in training children through a biblical worldview that will ground them in biblical principles long after they have graduated high school. This is what you are investing in daily when you send your children out the door for school.

So yes, you are raising grandchildren. Now think about what you want your grandchildren to look like? Do you want them to know Jesus? Do you want them to have values and integrity? Do you want them to be active members of society? Do you want them to have a heart, body, and mind to serve Jesus? If your answer is yes, then you can honestly say, "I am paying forward!"

Rigor, Relevance and Relationships is a catch-phrase that has gained momentum in the educational realm in recent years. Initially, in state school systems, the focus was on rigor and relevance. More recently, though, even the public schools are coming to terms with the importance of relationships in the educational process. Research over the last five years has confirmed that rigor and relevance alone

do not provide the optimal learning experience for students. While once frowned upon, relationships are now largely recognized as required.

In the Christian school, and certainly at Cambridge Christian School (or so I am told), relationships have always been emphasized. Our teachers seek to forge a bond with our students wherein a mutual trust exists that promotes individual mentoring

and discipleship. Teachers at CCS know and love our students beyond the curricular requirements. Our teachers, and the lives that they lead, represent the most dynamic portion of our curriculum. They are the "living curriculum." This is why it is so critical that each teacher's most important relationship is the one with Christ. The relationships that our staff develops with students, families, and each other, while imperfect, have been a strength of our program and will continue to be emphasized.

In the Christian school arena, however, rigor and relevance are, in some cases, afforded far less attention

than should be the case. Often, Christian school programs offering less than excellence in these areas identify budgetary constraints as the cause. Others go so far as to dismiss secular successes and voice resistance to any level of participation. In reality, acknowledging that the Common Core, for example, possesses some qualities that could enhance the rigor and relevance of our Christian school program does not constitute "bowing down" to the state school system, nor does it dictate compromise of the Biblical standard we are committed to uphold at CCS.

Rigor and relevance are often perceived to be lacking in Christian schools. In many cases, this perception is accurate. The cycle is vicious: funding is inadequate, substandard teachers are hired and retained, generic, outdated resources are adopted, technology is inaccessible and /or ignored, standards are non-existent, and unprepared students are graduated. Rigor is hit or miss, and relevance is abandoned. In many cases, these schools turn out young adults with a dynamic, growing faith that will guide them through the challenges they face. While this is the most important thing, to provide this alone is to do an injustice to our students and their families. Further, the tragedy is that some of these graduates will "settle" for serving in full-time ministry not because they are called, but instead, because it is one of the few pursuits for which they are "qualified" due to the lack of rigor they have experienced. We want our graduates in full-time ministry, but not as a fall back plan. We desire to graduate young adults whose lives are classified as full-time ministry regardless of their professional pursuits, whether they occur in the court room, the doctor's office, or on the mission field.

Cambridge Christian School is committed to providing a balance of rigor, relevance and relationships. Balance here will be defined as pursuing all three with equal vigor and aggression. Exposing our students and families to the truth of Christ will always be our most important purpose as a Christian school, but that does not have to happen at the expense of offering an excellent educational product. None of these will be sacrificed at CCS.

companies achieve their business objectives through strategic marketing solutions. He is also the founder and publisher of TwoTen Magazine and alumnus of Lifework Leadership.




has facilitated this class for the past three years. Led by Varsity Defensive Coordinator Steve Ater.



As a Cambridge School graduate in the class of 2004, I have been given both a quality education and a strong Christian foundation. From my parents and my teachers, I learned how to deepen my relationship with God and grow my appreciation for God's Word. Yet it was only recently that I fully realized the privilege we have to read God's Word in our own language.

Did you know that there are approximately 200 million people in the world today without any of the Bible in their language? They do not have even a single book of the Bible or an audio or video recording, such as The Jesus Film. My wife Katie and I are excited to be joining Wycliffe Bible Translators to help change that. We will be serving in Papua New Guinea amongst over 800 different language groups to help give God's Word to people who don't have it yet.

But we're not Bible translators and we're not your typical "missionaries". I'm an airplane pilot and mechanic while Katie is a project coordinator. As a pilot, I will be a critical link in the Bible translation process by transporting missionaries and supplies, sometimes even saving lives through emergency medical flights. It was at Cambridge that I first learned about missionary flying. While attending there, Wycliffe's partner organization, JAARS, brought their helicopter and landed it on the soccer field. What an exciting picture of the Kingdom of God: missionaries, pilots, mechanics, project coordinators, and many others using their specific talents and abilities to answer the call of getting the Word of God to the nations.

As I reflect on how God brought us to Wycliffe, I am thankful for a school like Cambridge Christian School where the Word of God is taught and lived out in the lives of students, teachers, and parents. Even here in the United States, our actions today can change the world tomorrow in places like Papua New Guinea. God has placed each of us in a unique role to further His kingdom. 
