<u>AP Seminar Summer Assignment</u>

Overview:

It is extremely important that you enter AP Seminar with an understanding of real-world issues that are happening locally, nationally, and globally. These real-world issues will drive your research and the problem solving that happens throughout the course. In order to expose you to these issues, this summer reading assignment will require you to visit several news outlets that cover local, national, and global issues. You will examine the context, credibility, importance, and implications of various **ARGUMENTS** to practice introductory skills that will be used throughout the course while also becoming more knowledgeable about relevant and timely issues in our world.

Directions:

- You may choose any 5 weeks during the summer to complete this assignment; however, you must use the sources provided. The articles must be dated within the 5 different weeks that you select & the articles you choose <u>MUST</u> <u>TAKE A POSITION OR MAKE AN ARGUMENT</u>.
- 2. Once you find an article, read it in its entirety. Think about the **argument**, the author, who is involved, when and where the issue is occurring, and why the issue is important.
- 3. Complete the attached questions page for each article.
- 4. Print and attach the article to the questions page.
- 5. On the first day of school, you should have 5 separate articles each with a questions page completed and attached.

Important Terms:

- 1. **Lens** filter through which an issue or topic is considered or examined (i.e., political and historical, environmental, economic, social and cultural, artistic, scientific, futuristic, ethical)
- 2. **Perspective** a point of view conveyed through an argument
- 3. **Argument** a claim or thesis that conveys a perspective developed through a line of reasoning and supported by evidence.
- 4. Bias- a personal opinion, belief, or value that may influence one's judgement, perspective, or claim
- 5. Credibility the degree to which a source is believable and trustworthy
- 6. **Implication** a possible future effect or result
- 7. Limitation- a boundary or point at which an argument or generalization is no longer valid
