Pride and Prejudice	Jane Austen	A story of manners and social status in 19th-century England, following the romance between Elizabeth Bennet and Mr. Darcy, exploring themes of love, marriage, class, and prejudice.
Their Eyes Were Watching God	Zora Neale Hurston	Janie Crawford, a young African-American woman who embarks on a journey of self-discovery and independence. The novel explores Janie's relationships with three different men and the challenges she faces as a woman trying to define herself in a society that often limits and oppresses her. Through Janie's experiences, the novel explores motifs of love, identity, and the search for fulfillment and meaning in life.
Frankenstein	Mary Shelley	A Gothic novel about Victor Frankenstein, a young scientist who creates a living being from human body parts, exploring themes of creation, ambition, morality, and the dangers of playing God.
A Thousand Splendid Suns	Khaled Hosseini	A novel about the struggles of two women, Mariam and Laila, living in Afghanistan during the Soviet invasion and the rule of the Taliban, exploring the impact of war and violence on families and communities.
