betray them entirely – particularly at the higher education level. Cambridge Christian School makes no apologies about adhering to Biblical standards and principles. We must take a stand.



The 2018-2019 school year is off to a great start! We completed a great summer camp program here on campus, featuring Drama Camp's Jungle Book production, STEM Camps, Sports Camps, Art Camps, Cooking Camps, and more! Some of our teachers were also able to experience some excellent professional development training this summer by attending biblical worldview conferences in Texas and reading conferences in Nevada. Standardized testing scores were high this year, with 76 students qualifying to be a Duke Tip

scholar, with most of them qualifying in multiple categories! Our school year began with over 70 new students and four new teachers joining the Lower School family. Dr. Rewa Chisholm joined us in fourth grade after 23 years of teaching and leading trainings in Hillsborough County and Florida.

Mrs. Elizabeth Schneegold also joined us as a first grade teacher after spending 25 years teaching in Florida, and Mrs. Danielle Vinca also joing us as Little Lambs Director. She comes to us with over 20 years experience in the early childhood field. We are very blessed to have such a qualified and godly group of women join our faculty this year.

Kingdom Education: The Early Years

As parents, we all have the greatest intentions when raising our children. We want them to be loving, successful, honest, independent and most importantly, we want them to love God with all their heart

(3 John 1:4). As a mother of two children, I understand these intentions very well. As we seek the best for our children, how does a Kingdom Education effect the early years of a child's life?

During the early years, a child's worldview and spiritual foundation are developed and is a significant building block in helping a child discover how much God truly loves them (2 Timothy 3:14-15). I love how God gave children this amazing capacity to receive and understand spiritual truth at an early age! A young child's faith is "imitative." They copy what they see and hear parents and teachers do. Young children also use their imaginations to understand and relate to God. They remember the Bible stories and songs they hear at home, church or school and blend them into their daily life. This is the building of their spiritual foundation. Like a house that is built on a solid foundation, it can withstand floods and storms. A life built on a strong spiritual foundation based on God's Word has eternal purpose on a child's spiritual development.

At Cambridge, we realize the importance of this Godordained role of partnering with parents in providing a Kingdom Education. We understand that one of the most important factors in developing a child's worldview is the influence of their teachers. Our teachers provide Biblical teaching that is interwoven and modeled throughout our children's day. We focus on the whole child; spiritually, intellectually, socially, emotionally, and physically. Most importantly, we delight in the opportunity to grow in God's love together, while providing the components that help to build a strong spiritual and academic foundation. Kingdom Education prepares our children for life and it begins in the early years.

In his article, Maximize the
Power of the Middle School Brain
(2017), Dr. Thomas Armstrong
stated, "It almost goes without
saying that middle school is the
most challenging level of
instruction in K-12 education."
Some might disagree, but having
personally taught first, fifth,
seventh, and eighth grades, and
spending one year in
high school teaching Freshman
English, I would concur with
that statement!

How would you define your middle school student? Loveable? Frustrating? Independent? Needy? A mass of contradictions? Put all these together, and you are close to an accurate description! A middle school student is in grades 6-8, which puts his/her age somewhere in the range of 11 to 14 years. This means they are a young or early adolescent. The early adolescent experiences change on almost every level: physical, intellectual, social, moral, and others.

To effectively teach and mentor a middle school student, it is critical you understand what is happening to them.

Physical

Puberty strikes in this age range, and with it comes an onslaught of hormones and strange, new feelings. Students will find their bodies changing, and while this is a beautiful part of God's plan for us, it is also uncomfortable, awkward, and sometimes, a little frightening. This is especially true if a boy finds himself the first in class whose voice changes or a young lady is the first in her peer group to need a bra.

Children in this age range are often gawky or gangly, but there is a reason for that! Bones are growing faster than muscles, which leads to clumsiness (gawky) and the head and hands can also grow faster than the arms and legs (gangly).

Intellectual

The brain is growing; in fact, the growth that appears from ages 11-15 is the second greatest in a human's life. The ability to think abstractly will develop during this age span. However, the brain is another area of contradiction for the middle school student! The prefrontal cortex is growing; this is the part of the brain we use for decision-making and judgment. However, the hormones that come with puberty put the student's emotions on high, and unfortunately,

this "emotional brain" is functioning long before the executive brain functions have kicked in. This leads to the volatile emotions and drama that parents and teachers know come with the middle school territory. Middle school students will often act before they think, and even when asked why they did what just did, parents and teachers will frequently get the infuriating answer of "I don't know." What we must try to understand is that, sometimes, they really don't know!

Social/Moral

During this stage, students are actively searching to discover and establish their own identity, and their personal knowledge and experiences will serve as the filter they use in their attempt to make sense of the world. Up to this time, the elementary student has taken pride in following the rules, but the middle school student begins to question both the rules AND the people who made them. While parents and teachers have been seen as wise and all-knowing, this ends now!

The peer group becomes of prime importance, and the acceptance of their peers is everything to the middle school student. They will fiercely fight for independence one moment, but conversely, they desperately want to have the love and support of parents and teachers behind them. They are watching the adults in their life carefully to see if we accept and value them just the way they are. In searching for their own identity, they want everyone to see them as unique and special, but contrarily, they don't want any differentiation from their peers and want to be seen as "just like everyone else."

So, how does this translate into our middle school, its vision, and its philosophy?

Biblical Worldview

If you comprehend the changes the middle school student is undergoing, then it is clear how essential the principles of Kingdom Education become (Schultz, 2002). Two of these principles resonate with me every day – that education must be based on God's Word as absolute truth and that education must hold Christ preeminent in all of life.

While the academic, emotional, and social growth of each student is vitally important to us, the primary goal of our middle school program is to incorporate a Biblical worldview into every single classroom. In fact, we don't want to just incorporate it; we want to seamlessly weave the fabric of God's truth into our curriculum and instruction so that recognizing the glory and omnipotence of God becomes as natural to our students as breathing. Each classroom has a set of our 12 Truth Strands prominently placed, and each unit taught will have numerous areas in which students are challenged to see how these truth strands connect to the content they are learning. If our students are searching to find out who they are, we want to ensure they establish their identity firmly in Jesus. When it is time to send our middle school students to high school, we want them to go with a knowledge of and relationship with Christ resolutely in their hearts.

"Renaissance" Program

If our students are using their personal experiences as they search for

their identities, we want to give them opportunities to explore numerous areas of interest! We don't want to "pigeonhole" them at this age! We want them to discover talents they didn't realize they had and appreciate what an incredible undle of potential they are! With choir, band, art, gardening, robotics, introduction to engineering, drama, and an incredible athletic program of 12 different sports, we hope that our students get to "taste" anything that interests them. Each year, we look at ways to incorporate more choices into our program. An item on my personal "challenge" list is to find a way to provide a graphic design, a culinary art, and a computer coding elective in the next vear or so.

House System

In the 2017-18 school year, we unveiled a "house system." With Joshua 1:9 as our guide, we established the houses of Tolmao (Courage) and Dunamis (Strength). Each house consists of both seventh and eighthgrade students, boys and girls. The students sit with their houses during middle school chapel and on our weekly advisory days. The House Council serves as the student leadership group for the middle school and assists in planning different activities throughout the year, such as Homecoming Week activities, semester parties, and service projects.

Throughout the year, each house receives points for numerous and varied activities, such as winning games and competitions, mastering the most IXL units, and best results for a service project. At the end of the year, the house that has the highest total points receives the coveted house cup!

Additionally, a student who receives a merit point through the upper school discipline system not only receives the personal accolades that come with the point but also earns points for his/her house! There is also a consequence side in which a house could experience deductions from their score should a student receive a demerit. The motivation behind the points is to promote positive peer influence and to







encourage students to help one another and hold each other accountable.

The MS house system provides our students with the following opportunities:

- Vertical mentoring across grade levels
- Leadership opportunities within houses and grade levels
- Constructive competition and positive peer influence
- An organizational structure that promotes teamwork
- Promotion of servant leadership

Student Activities

We want to create a sense of family and teamwork in our middle school, and the best way to do that is to have fun together! We began the year by welcoming the new seventh graders into their houses with an afternoon spent at QZar. The house competition began *(continued)*





that day with the winner of each laser tag match accumulating points for their house.

Each year, both the seventh and eighth grade classes take a class retreat. The seventh grade spends a day at the Day Springs Episcopal Camp, and the eighth grade has an overnight retreat at Cedarkirk. Each semester, the House Council plans a themed party for the middle school, and we will also have a service project in each semester. Every other Thursday advisory period, the houses gather for an exciting, fun game or competition that generates points for the winning house. Our J-term has a fabulous new activity for this school year as, for the first-time ever, the eighth grade will travel for three days to Washington, D.C. Seventh grade will have a service-oriented J-term that will conclude with a day at Disney.

Another addition to our middle school this year is the creation of game time during our lunch break! Over the summer, our incredible Mr. Brian Willeke built a gaga pit for us right off the freshman deck, and that has been a huge hit with our students! Lunchtime now finds our students either in the gaga pit or playing spike ball, cornhole, frisbee, or volleyball. We have seen new friendships formed as students have this additional opportunity to have fun and play together.

Discipline

The hormones and emotions are on high, they act and speak before they think, and they want to challenge every rule and push the boundaries! This makes discipline one of the greatest challenges we face in middle school and one of our biggest areas of contention with parents. Sometimes, one of the greatest hurdles we have is trying to explain that there is a difference between recognizing the challenges that the middle school student faces and accepting these challenges as an excuse for bad behavior.



Middle school students do not respond well to regimentation, but they also crave to be shown the boundaries for acceptable versus unacceptable behavior. Our middle school team endeavors to show them these boundaries and set our expectations with patience, humor, grace, and love, but we also do hold our students accountable for their behavior. We strive every day to teach them the real-life adage of "actions have consequences." The point system used in the upper school allows us to recognize good behavior with "merit" points as well as issue demerits for poor behavior choices.

Cooperative Learning/ Project-Based Learning/ Engaged Learning

Finding ways to get the students to connect classroom content to real life experiences is another goal of our program. Middle school students must see learning as relevant to their lives before they "buy in" to it. When you combine this with their physical energy and their increased socialness, the traditional "lecture/read the textbook" approach is not going to work.

Project-based learning (PBL) units, such as the seventh-grade bridge

building program and the eighth-grade inventions project, not only allow the students to explore real-world problems but also show the students how content connects

across multiple disciplines.


Cooperative learning allows students to work together to accomplish learning goals, but this is done within clearly defined structures. It transcends traditional group work and requires "positive interdependence, individual accountability, equal participation, and simultaneous interaction" (Kagan, 2017). Two of our teachers spent a week in Orlando this past summer at Kagan seminars learning how to integrate cooperative learning into their classrooms, and our goal is for every middle school teacher to attend this training over the next few years.

Do we always get it right in middle school? I wish I could say yes, but just as every parent wrestles with making the right choices for their child, our team struggles every day with making the right decisions for the numerous situations we face. And when we do get it wrong, it grieves our heart. Yet, our middle school team is devoted to doing the absolute best we can for each precious soul that is entrusted to us each day. It is a privilege to come in each day and partner with my middle school colleagues. They love

the Lord, they love our students, and they are great at what they do!



In this verse Paul is praying that we would be filled by the God who is able to do far beyond what we can imagine. He is praying for God's own to be filled with the fullness of God and His endless love. As a staff we have asked for the Lord to fill us with his strength and love, and He has done so in ways that have blessed us beyond our human expectations. As we have sought the Lord's guidance and leading. He has responded. We are blessed to play a role in what the Lord is doing at CCS. This 2018-2019 school year has begun, and His power has been at work within us. We may be only a quarter of the way into the school year, but we recognize the blessings that our all-powerful God has bestowed upon us and we are rejoicing in Him.

A new school year represents new beginnings filled with opportunities. We welcomed 45 new students this year to the Upper School. There are new leadership organizations, honor societies, trips, J-term offerings, courses/electives,



and traditions in both middle and high school this year. These are all exciting enrichments to our already blossoming program. In the past three years we have introduced a variety of new additions to our Upper School program and the Lord has blessed each one. We are thankful and blessed beyond measure.

We began this school year with no turn over in staff, which is amazing. In the middle school we were able to add a new teacher to the team which is a reflection of God blessing us with growth and provision. Our faculty is dedicated and committed to pursuing God's excellence in all they do in and out of the classroom. This past summer we challenged them to grow professionally and they responded by completing over 17,000 pages of reading, new certifications, educational webinars/workshops/conferences, and many traveled the globe.

The abundance of God's provision continues as we analyze student performance over the past three years. Our Advanced Placement student passing rates are averaging 22% above state standings and 17% above global standings. SAT mathematics scores have improved by 8% in the last year. The SAT verbal standings have increased an average of 3% to 4% per year since 2016. Over the past three years our students' PSAT math and English scores have consistently improved, and they are scoring at above average rates. The middle school's Terra Nova standings have also shown growth over the past three years. As a whole, 7th and 8th graders are demonstrating between 75%-80% high mastery of both English and math content for their grade - well

rejoice with them. The Lord is challenging our students to grow in their faith, to be real in their walk. As a staff we see the Lord at work and it's humbling. There is still a great harvest to reap but we believe the Lord is faithful.

Since school began we have not missed a beat. Our faculty and students are thriving and growing. God is faithful and continues to bless us in ways that daily remind us of his providence. This year we will graduate our largest senior class in CCS history. We have 70 seniors! The class of 2019 has 16 Lancers for Life, one of the biggest groups we have had in recent years. We are looking forward to all that the Lord has before us this upcoming year with great anticipation. It's great to be a Cambridge Lancer!




STEM Update

Equally exciting is the organization of the STEM Student Advisory Panel which will allow for students to provide student-led feedback and leadership as they steer the direction of the program and foster community among our STEM students. 

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

"Be kind to one another," Ephesians 4:32. This is in my favorite verse in the Bible. It is the verse my, then, 3-year-old son taught me. Yes, my 3-year-old! My name is Danielle Vinca and I am a Cambridge Alumna. I started in 1st grade and graduated from Cambridge in 1996. I was taught


